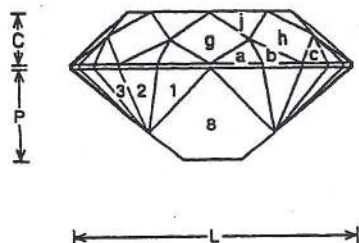
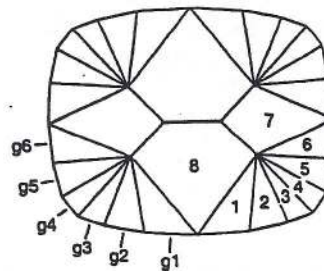
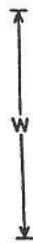
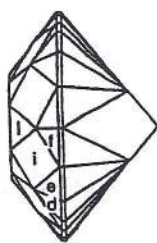
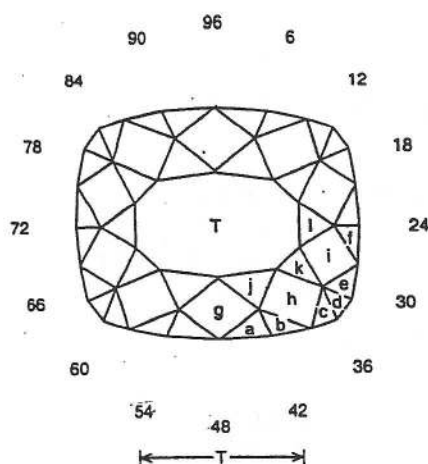
The next item on the agenda was a presentation by Tyler Miller of the possibility of a Guild website. He will attempt to have a presentation at the next general meeting on this issue.

FACETING MYTHS

1. It is very difficult to learn how to facet.

This is not true at all. Many people can start to facet in a matter of hours. It is something very easy to learn, but difficult to master.

2. You must go to school and pay for instructions.

There is really no reason why a person could not learn all the necessary steps out of a book or by practice. Anyone can also attend faceting workshops like those put on by our club and get free instruction and advice.

3. You must have an excellent knowledge of math.

You will have very little requirements to use math at all in faceting. Many books are available that give you all the angle indexing for many more cuts than you will ever use.

4. You must have excellent eyesight to facet.

Good eyesight is an advantage, but not a requirement. Henry Grave's (the inventor of the Grave's Faceting Machine) daughter used to give demonstrations of using the machine blindfolded. The use of some type of magnification while you cut is usually very desirable and recommended for most people.

5. You must be able to hear well.

Many older faceters are almost deaf, many using hearing aids, and all wish they could hear better, but that does not keep them from faceting.

6. It is very expensive.

You can spend a great deal of money buying faceting equipment, but a lot of used equipment is available at a reduced price. Also, many people have built their own faceting machines.

7. The most expensive machine you can buy is best.

All a faceting machine does is make a lap go around, let you measure and angle with a protractor, and divide a circle into segments.

8. Faceting material in the rough is very expensive.

Yes, you can spend a great deal of money on faceting rough. It is not always necessary. Most of the quartz family is not expensive, and you can cut beautiful gems of clear quartz, smoky quartz, amethyst, citrine, and others. You can also go to dig

site locations and look for many valuable stones such as sapphires and garnets.

9. A beginner should start on clear quartz, since it is the least expensive of the quartz family.

It is better to start on material that has some color in it as it will let you see your polish better.

10. Many instructors require their facet students to cut some cabochons prior to studying faceting.

This requirement is not necessary at all. Many fine faceters have never cut a cabochon in their lives.

The four basic faceting steps are simple:

1. The selection of faceting material. Any lapidary shop owner will help you in your selection. In selecting your material, it is good to have an idea of the stone you expect to cut from that particular piece of rough.
2. Pre-form the rough materials to the **SHAPE THAT YOU EXPECT TO CUT FROM IT**, either on a cabochon grinding outfit or on your own faceting machine.
3. Dop your stone on your dop stick and follow the instructions in your book regarding the angles you should use for the type of material you are cutting. Use your index to cut your stone into the necessary segments.
4. Cut your facets by using the usual sequence of a rough grind, a medium grind, and a fine grind. On finishing the grinding process, select the best polishing compound for the stone you are cutting and finalize the polish.

FACETERS GLOSSARY

Refractive Index: The ratio of the speed of light in air to its speed in a substance.

Biaxial: A doubly-refractive gemstone which has two optic axes (directions of single refraction); a property possessed by crystals of the orthorhombic, monoclinic and triclinic systems only.

Single refraction: When a ray of light enters a crystal of the isometric system, or of an amorphous substance, it is not polarized.

Double refraction: The separation of an incident beam of light into two polarized beams which pass through a crystal at different speeds. This is the property of all crystals not belonging to the isometric system.

Face: In crystallography, one of the plane surfaces which forms the sides, and often (theoretically at least) the ends or termination of a crystal.

Facet: One of the small, plane, or approximately plane polished surfaces which are placed upon gemstones fashioned as brilliant cut, step cut, or any other faceted cut.

Fire: Flashes of spectral colors seen in gemstones as the result of dispersion.

Gem: A cut and polished material which possesses the beauty, durability and rarity necessary for use in jewelry. Also used to describe an especially fine specimen, as a gem emerald.

Pavilion: That portion of a faceted diamond or other gem material below the girdle.

Crown: The part of any faceted gem material above the girdle.

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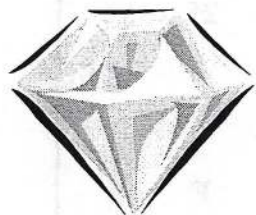

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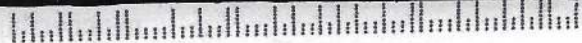
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
